3.1	Proposed Hire Report / Incentive Plans under \$3,000 / Weekly Reclassification Report	The Proposed Hire Report is a weekly report of active job postings to recruit and hire new SLCO employees. The Incentive Plans Report is a list of all incentive plans under \$3,000 that were signed that week and the Weekly Reclassification Report is a spreadsheet of all completed job reclassifications

3.2 At the Salt Palace, we have additional spending and revenue variances in our 2022 operations. We would like to appropriate some of those funds into the following projects: Project SP22 03 DA Tank and Tube bundle replacement Add \$120,000 Justification: This project initially claimed funds from a different project approved in 2022. This project was created due to an exigent need as a result of failures in these parts within the heating system. At the time, the funds were limited by the cancelled project. As this project has developed, we have learned that the initial funding claimed is inadequate to replace all of the needed parts. These additional dollars should cover the remaining tube bundle replacement. Project SP22 02 Upgrade elevators Add \$214,000 Justification: This project was funded in 2022 to replace the mechanical parts that operate three elevators that service the parking structure located at 200S and Budget Adjustment: Salt Palace's 200W. The funding in that original project was only adequate to address Appropriation Unit Shift of two of the three elevators. These additional dollars will allow us to fully \$574,000 from Operations to 4 upgrade the mechanical components in the third elevator. **Existing Capital Projects.** and replace the ballroom chair inventory.

Project SP-SM-Equip Chairs Add \$180,000 Justification: We would like to use these dollars to continue to upgrade the ballroom chairs at the Salt Palace Convention Center. The small equipment fund typically utilized at the Salt Palace for these purchases was utilized this year for other equipment needs. We would like to use these funds to continue to add

Project SP0116 Parking projects (painting) Add \$60,000 Justification: This project calls for the repainting of parking stalls in the south parking structure. This project was planned for in the 2023 capital request. We would like to advance this project so we can complete it concurrently with the opening of the Hyatt Regency (shared parking agreement).

We have a projected \$990,000 positive spending variance for 2022. These additions total \$574,000.

The pricing to complete the removal and replacement of the MAEC cooling tower fill packs has increased 20 percent from when we Budget Adjustment: Mountain proposed the project in 2020. The state agency has confirmed that they are supportive of this reallocation of funds 3.5 As previewed in the Mayor's June budget presentation (see attached slide), this adjustment increases the contractually-required expenditure and revenue (see attached agreement), based on the updated 2022 taxable value of the Convention Center Hotel and the proposed tax rate (see calculation below). Budget Adjustment: Mayor's 2022 Taxable value: \$100,453,900 \* 2022 Proposed tax rate: .010537 = Finance and Administration \$1,058,483 Requests a Budget Adjustment to True Up the Incremental The tax rate will be final in mid-September, the additional \$41K+ in the Property Tax Pass Through budget provides a buffer for any related changes. We are also adjusting Amount that the County Remits the budget to use more appropriate accounts for the situation. to the Convention Center Hotel Per the agreement, the Treasurer pays the collected property taxes to the County, and, if no holdback by the SLC RDA to pay prior bond holders (highly unlikely to occur), the County then remits the same amount to the hotel owner. The future year adjustment is due to an anticipated increase to the hotel's taxable value in 2023. 3.6 The County is self-insured for medical insurance, meaning we pay the actual claims as they are incurred. In 2022 actual medical claims and some related costs have increased more than what was anticipated for in the budget. Because claims and reinsurance premiums are projected Budget Adjustment: Mayor's to be over what is budgeted in 2022, we are requesting a budget Finance and Administration adjustment in the ESR Fund to cover these projected costs. The lines Requests \$5.6M for the ESR Fund being adjusted are for PEHP and Select Health medical claims and to Cover Increases in 2022 Actual reinsurance premiums. The ESR Fund has medical insurance reserves Medical Claims and Anticipated that will cover the increase in these expenses. Claims and Reinsurance Premiums in 2023. Medical costs in future years may continue to increase more than they have in prior years and 2023 adjustments could be needed to County and employee premiums, and to accounts in the ESR Fund, to cover costs and maintain reserves.

3.7	Budget Adjustment: IT Requests an Appropriation Unit Shift of the \$700,000 from the Office Furniture and Equipment Account to the Appropriate Expenditure Account for the Approved County-Wide Video Conferencing Equipment Project.	IT is proposing the wide deployment of video conference room systems in order to better enable hybrid work and collaboration. We have surveyed County agencies for need as well as identifying specific conference rooms where Video Conferencing capability is desired. The systems as proposed are based on the Cisco WebEx systems currently in use throughout the County but are compatible with all major video conferencing systems (zoom, google meet, teams, etc).  At the time that the request was submitted for this project the split between operating and capital expenditures had not been determined, since the exact number, size and layout of the conference rooms had not been determined. We now know which conference rooms have been selected, so we need to shift the budget to the proper appropriation units.

Salt Lake County has the opportunity to review how services countywide are delivered to ensure efficiency, effectiveness, and accessibility. This project contemplates hiring a partner to assess opportunities for physical, digital, and human capital transformation to create a roadmap for smart investment and modern service delivery.  Requesting Transformational Initiative Funding. This could be a potential ARPA funding.

3.10	Presentation on Proposed Enactment of New Public Access Records Management Ordinances and Policies	Salt Lake County currently has one lengthy ordinance and 16 individual policies that are meant to guide the public and employees in accessing and providing access to records. The ordinance and policies are confusing, sometimes conflicting, full of duplication and often outdated as they frequently refer to state law, which changes from time to time. The goal of the re-write condenses 16 policies into two new policies: 1) Public Access and 2) Records and Information Management (RIM) policies. The 16 existing policies totaled 39 pages, while the 2 new policies total 6. The existing GRAMA ordinance totaled 11 pages and is now condensed to 5. These new polices ensure accessibility for both County employees and the public, as well as removing duplicative language found in statute.
